TODAY’S ENVIRONMENTAL TIP

On average, Canadians produce half of their annual 5-tonnes of greenhouse emissions from driving. A simple way to cut down on these emissions is to consider making some trips by bike or on foot. The average Canadian takes over 2,000 car trips each year that are less than 3km (about a 10 minute bike ride). These trips are ideally suited for switching to active transportation, which offers health and economic benefits in addition to the environmental benefit. It is projected that by increasing the number of trips traveled by bike or on foot, we can reduce vehicular emissions by 5-15%.
